This multicultural option that is situated in the crossroads between atlantic continents, lacks all centralism because we consider that the center is everywhere. With the purpose of increasing the attention due to atlantic cultural phenomena we have began our new period.

We have found it necessary and convenient to effect a new design that no doubt you will find different to the one you have seen up to now. Image occupies a fundamental place in it.
